

But you do think that feminism is the radical notion that women are people, and that's what makes you important.

Men and Feminism

Since the 19th century men have played a significant part within the feminist movement. For example, in 1886, John Stuart Mill wrote The Subjection of Women which focused on the institution of marriage, revealing the sacrifices of women which include liberty, rights, and property. Another male feminist is Fredrick Douglass who was one of the thirty-one men who attended the first women's rights convention, the Seneca Falls Convention of 1886. Douglass espoused suffrage as a right and as nothing to do with sex. At the convention Douglass stated, "When I ran away from slavery, it was for myself;" when I advocated for emancipation, it was for my people; but when I stood up for the rights of women, self was out of the question, and I found a little nobility in the act." Therefore as history shows men can be feminists since it furthers the movement. Also, men should be allowed and encouraged to participate in feminism. Interestingly enough, 20 percent of American men consider themselves to be a feminist. Those same men said that feminism had improved their lives.

It is of no secret that masculinity comes with a range of costs such as becoming the permanent breadwinner, suppressing emotions, shorter life expectancy, losing child custody cases, and maintaining friendships only with men.
