Bowling Green KY May 21st 1864

Dear Father

We arrived here after very tiresome march of [[tear in letter]] 35 miles yesterday evening and was paid after Dark I send you by express \$70 00 The Capt paid me \$25 00 and George 20 and I send you the rest out of my 2 month pay Jimmie send some though I do not know how much. I have very little time to write it is four O clock in the morning and we march at six. Nashville We will get to about Tuesday not before I am very anxious
