He is very well contented. Says he wont leave the Company he keeps in good spirits all the time and being so hearty he may get all over it

Our Horses begin to look

good Clover field to pasture  
them in during the day and  
good Corn for them at night  
they all looked very bad  
when they arrived here the  
long march told on them  
as well as on our My Horse  
stood it very well his back  
got a little sore but it is  
all well now — I have  
not been on him since  
we got here as we have
