Although a man may have comparatively little culture, but little genius and not much wealth, if he has a noble character he will always command an influence with his fellows.

A great English statesman said, "My road must be through character to power; I will try no other course; and I am sanguine enough to believe that this course, tho' not perhaps the quickest, is the surest ".

There is a tendency to applaud mere smartness and cleverness. You may admire men of genius and intellect, but there is something more necessary before you trust them. They must have character, the chief element perhaps is integrity.

The Century Dictionary defines character as "the sum

of the inherited acquired ethical traits which gives to a person his moral individuality".

It is a composition of good qualities, such as integrity, truthfulness, self-respect, industry, kindness, gentleness, good habits, goodmorals and good man-ners.

All of you are building character. You began this when boys and girls. The process is going on whether playing, dreaming or working. Wherever you are or what you may be doing, you must carry on this sublime work.

If earlier in life you have done some poor work, used questionable material, begin now and in earnest to rebuild rightly. You are old enough to be thoughtful. You will be judged both here and hereafter by the character you have.

He that is good will infallibly become better and he that is bad will as certainly become worse, for vice, virtue and time are three things that never stand still.

I mention all the qualities that go to make character.

All are important.

I want to impress upon you the importance of forming good habits, for character may be strengthened and supported by good habits.

One philosopher said - "All is habit in mankind, even virtue itself.

Another impresses the importance of self-discipline and firm resistance to temptation, as tending to make virtue habitual, so that at length it may be easier to be good than to give way to sin".

We cannot over-estimate the power of habit, and too carefully guard against evil habits, for character is always weakest at that point at which it has once given way.
