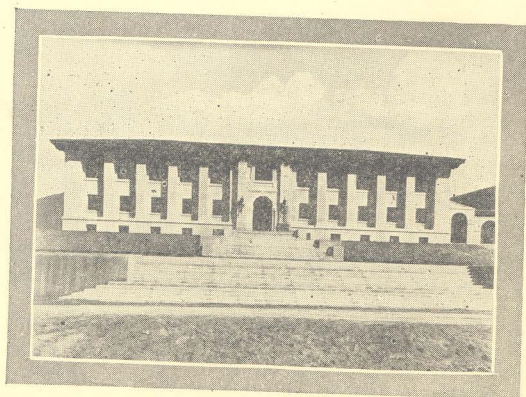

CENTRAL BUILDING, CITRUS EXPERIMENT STATION, RIVERSIDE

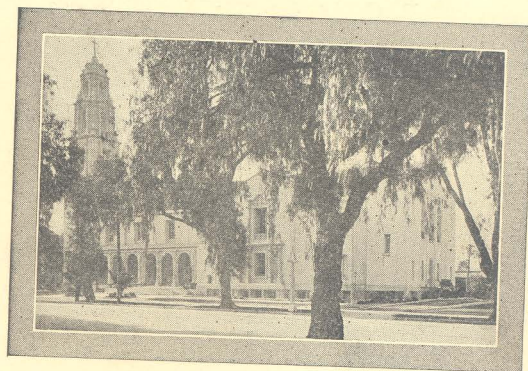
