I wish I had command of words to express the joy in my heart created by being here today with you. You form a group of choice, ambitious young people who have come to this institution to better prepare for life.

As you leave college to enter the activities of life, in whatever line, you will find a world torn, shattered. Every phase of life is disrupted. The tragedy of all time among Nations is upon us. It is to you and others gifted and trained as you are being, that the talk of reconstructing a wrecked world will be given. May all of you be Divinely guided so that you will rebuild so that never again may a few ambitious men destroy it.

I have from the beginning of this institution stressed two distinct, yet all comprehensive achievements of those who come here, - the building of a Christian character and the development of an attractive personality.

These accomplishments will carry one further on in a career of a useful happy life than any other I can think of.

In this last talk here on our beautiful campus, at least for some time, I want to briefly stress the same thought.

When you have formed a noble Christian character you will have enriched your life as no acquisition of wealth, position

or possession of worldly power can do. It will do for you far more than anything else you may possess. It is the highest and noblest possession in life. A great English statesman said, "My road must be through character to power; I will try no other course. Though not perhaps the quickest, it is the surest".

Franklin attributed his success as a public man not to his talents or his power of speaking, but to his known integrity of character.

industry, kindness, gentleness, good habits, good morals and good manners, all inspired by abiding faith in Jesus, and determination to be the kind of a person that He would have you be.

All of these qualities however highly developed, must be bound together bytthat higher quality, the spiritual, the Divine, within us. Without this, one is like the rough block of marble. With it, like the beautiful statue.

All of you are building character. You began when boys and girls. The process is going on, whether playing, dreaming or working. Wherever you are or whatever you may be doing, you must carry on this sublime work.

If earlier in life you may have done some poor work, used questionable material in building, I am sure, since you have been here, in fellowship with other fine young people, and led and taught by as able and splendid group of instructors as may be found in any institution of learning, you have been inspired to nobler living by being in the presence of these consecrated teachers who are wholly devoted to your welfare.

May I, in a word, further emphasize the importance of this process of building character, and the danger confronting you on every hand. - - - -

As a Nation we have become intoxicated with respect to material progress. We have reached out into every physical

realm and become almost masters of every force in Nature.

These achievements have so fascinated man that we have abandoned much in life that is fundamental to our happiness.

This has brought a waning in our interest even in religion.

So, be on your guard. Only a strong character, faith in the Christ and fellowship with good companions, good books and activity in the Church, can save you.

Now a word about personality. The small college provides the atmosphere conducive to the development of a desirable personality much better than the crowded University

Here you have easy contact with the Faculty, every member of it being desirous of helping you.

Personality is the combination of all your qualities,intellectual, social bearing and contacts. Be gracious,
not cold and grouchy. Wear a smile and not a frown. Enrich
your mind with wholesome learning, care for your body,
develop your spiritual nature and be gracious, - be cordial.
