Greetings to preachers

My high regard for the ministry. My respect for ministers. Those present when I gave my course of lectures know something of my high regard and love for the ministers.

Honor you who have dedicated your lives to the ministry and with the purpose to be faithful ambassadors of Christ.

Every church enterprise to succeed must have the preachers back of it.

For eighteen years as President of Missionary Society. I found we could get nowhere without the preacher.

Perhaps never more of them interested than now.

Next to the minister is the Chairman of the Official Board. Business men have a place and part in the church work and life. Both key men. Welcome both.

Enjoy fellowship. Good idea to come together.

Come tonight to consider the greatest enterprise of the church here in California - C.C.C.

If we are not conducting the affairs of the College properly, or as we should, we would be happy to have you come and advise with us.

We may have made mistakes. I am sure we have.

This largely in an attempt, as Mr. Worthy said "to crowd into ten years what it has taken others fifty to accomplish":

We may have gone too fast. It is so difficult here where everything goes with such a rush, and the whole atmosphere is surcharged with that sort of spirit, to hold back and go slowly.

Generally we appreciate things in proportion to what we put into them. This does not necessarily mean money. It does however, mean thought and time, interest, love and life.

Give to any object these elements of yourself in a generous measure and that thing will be dear to you.

C.C.C. is dear to a large and increasing group of young people for what it has done for them. Done in the way of mental discipline and training, spiritual enlightenment and development and for charming and helpful friend ships formed.

We are to build here a great educational institution one with ideals and standards high, and to do this all of
us must in every way give and do our best. Not only that
but seek the guidance and inspiration of the Great Teacher,
our Divine Master.

We must have the consciousness of His presence in our own hearts and in the life of the school.

I am happy to be associated with you in this glorious task.

Tremendously important and must be put over.

If we are to do the most for Jesus and His church must have trained and equipped leaders. Both in the pulpit and in the management of the church and in the community life.

Must have an institution for their training. Elders, deacons, etc.

Dr. Alexander Campbell, in an address given at the laying of the cornerstone of Bethany College said some pertinent things, as follows:

ings, with libraries, with apparatus and with a well educated corps of professors, is not quite so easily reared and consummated as Young America dreams or imagines.

We have had some little experience on this subject in the colleges of the Old World and the New. We have some volumes of theory and a few chapters of experience, which have been read and studied with care.

Colleges are, in every point of view, the most important and useful institutions on earth, second only to the Church of Christ in their inherent claims upon Christian liberality and Christian patronage. If they be not worthy of the smiles, the prayers and the contributions of a Christian community, I know not, beyond the Church, what is, or ought to be, an appropriate and an approved object of Christian patronage and Christian liberality".
