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Dutch Filmmaker's Controversial Short Feature To Screen April 4

ORANGE, Calif., March 27, 2009 – A screening of the controversial Dutch film *Fitna* will take place on Saturday, April 4 at 2 p.m. in Memorial Hall at Chapman University. Filmmaker Geert Wilders will be present to introduce the film and take part in a discussion with the audience afterward. Geert Wilders, who is a parliamentary leader in the Netherlands, has come under public attack for making the 15-minute film *Fitna*, which juxtaposes verses from the Koran with scenes of violence carried out by jihadists. He is being prosecuted in the Netherlands for what the government is calling a hate crime, and was recently refused entry to Great Britain. He is currently traveling and speaking in the United States and Canada, and is under 24-hour protection due to death threats.
