Kristallnacht: A Night of Broken Glass and Shattered Community

Please join us for an interfaith service in remembrance of Kristallnacht, the "Night of Broken Glass" or "Crystal Night." Kristallnacht took place on November 9-10, 1938 when the Nazis launched a tidal wave of violence against Jews throughout Germany and Austria. Dozens of synagogues were destroyed and desecrated; thousands of shop and store windows were shattered, and, subsequently, more than 25,000 Jewish men were rounded up and sent to concentration camps. Our special guest will be Cantor Leopold Szneer, cantor emeritus of Congregation Mogen David in Los Angeles, who will share with us his memories of Kristallnacht. Sixteen years old in 1938, Cantor Szneer was among those sent to the Dachau concentration camp after Kristallnacht. He was later imprisoned in the Malines transit camp and the Breendonck concentration camp in Belgium, and spent nine months hiding in a small attic in Brussels until he was liberated shortly before Rosh Hashanah in 1944. The interfaith service will be followed by a FREE Shabbat dinner sponsored by the Hillel Organization.
