First of Three Immigration Debates Features Experts on Dec. 14

ORANGE, Calif., Dec. 1, 2006 – Two national experts will argue the issues in the first of three scheduled debates at Chapman University titled "Immigration Reform: Hard Choices Facing America" on Thursday, Dec. 14 in Kennedy Hall at 7 p.m., presented by the Anti-Defamation League (www.adl.org) and the Chapman University School of Law.

Richard Lamm, former governor of Colorado and co-director of the Institute for Public Policy Studies at the University of Denver, and Jeffrey Davidow, president of the Institute of the Americas and former U.S. ambassador to Mexico, will go head-to-head to ask, "Can the United States find an effective and fair immigration policy?" They will discuss issues including the impact of immigration on our national identity, jobs and the economy; the pros and cons of the border fence; and whether or not Mexico should be viewed and treated as a special case.

Upcoming debates in the series will be Tuesday, Feb. 13, featuring Orange County Sheriff Mike Carona and Garden Grove police chief Joseph Polisar; and Thursday, March 15 (participants to be announced). All debates begin at 7 p.m.
