Miranda and the War on Terror

There has been considerable recent debate about interrogation tactics employed in the War on Terror, both at home and abroad. To what extent will *Miranda* and other civil liberties be extended in warfare, given that the warfare now occurs on U.S. soil, and that the meaning of "war" has become so uncertain?

Miranda and the Media

To what extent does the modern understanding, courtesy of mass media, factor into current application of *Miranda*? Have *Miranda* warnings become more or less important? More broadly, how does intense media scrutiny impact high profile investigations, such as the one that led to the recent Scooter Libby indictment?

Miranda and Modern Practice

Miranda is designed to prevent coerced confessions. After 40 years, does it actually achieve this purpose, or has law enforcement been able to adapt their practices to overcome the protections that *Miranda* provides suspects? Panelists will discuss whether *Miranda* in fact helps prevent convictions of innocent persons due to coercive police practices.

Miranda and Corporate Crime

What is *Miranda*'s role following Sarbanes-Oxley, enacted in the wake of tremendous corporate scandals such as Enron? Does this legislation impose obligations on corporate insiders to cooperate with government investigators in a way that violates *Miranda*'s protection against self-incrimination? Will the new McNulty Memorandum, which has replaced the widely criticized Thompson Memorandum, achieve the right balance in guiding prosecutors to ferret out corporate crime while respecting legal rights?

Keynote Address by Edwin Meese III

Former Attorney General Edwin Meese III will give the keynote speech, "A Republic, If You Can Keep It," which is the line spoken by Benjamin Franklin at the conclusion of the constitutional convention. The theme of the talk will be whether the constitution is a foundation or a trampoline, and whether the Supreme Court is taking over war-making powers. Introduction by John C. Eastman, *Interim Associate Dean of Administration and Henry Salvatori Professor of Law & Community Service at Chapman University School of Law, and Director of The Claremont Institute Center for Constitutional Jurisprudence.*

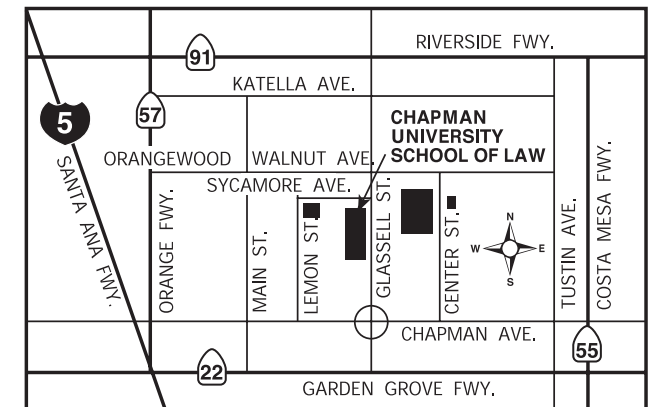
