DEAR MOM:

SOMEWHERE ON THE PACIFIC OCEAN HEADING WEST SOMEWHERE. DON'T KNOW WHERE WE'RE GOING YET OR WHEN WE'LL ARRIVE. THIS LETTER WILL BE MAILED AS SOON AS WE ARRIVE.

THE ACCOMODATIONS ON THIS BOAT ARE WONDERFUL. WE COULDN'T GET BETTER IF WE WERE PAYING FOR IT. THE MEALS ARE WONDERFUL, SERVICE SWELL. IF ONLY PEARL WERE WITH ME, IT COULD REALLY BE A SECOND HONEYMOON.

YOU'LL RECEIVE A CARD SHOWING A DIFFERENT ADDRESS THAN THE ONE ON THIS LETTER. MAKE SURE YOU WRITE TO THAT ADDRESS AND NOT THIS ONE. I SURE HOPE THAT THERE IS MAIL FROM BOTH YOU AND FRANCES WHEN I ARRIVE. PROBABLY WHEN WE GET SETTLED, I'LL BE ABLE TO LET YOU KNOW MY GENERAL LOCALITY.

WE PASSED THE EQUATOR YESTERDAY AND HAD A LITTLE CELEBRATION IN HONOR OF IT. WE REALLY HAD A LOT OF FUN. THE TRIP SO FAR HAS BEEN VERY NICE, ESPECIALLY SINCE I DIDN'T GET THE LEAST BIT SEASICK. I'M GETTING A BIT TIRED OF SEEING SO MUCH WATER, AND SURE WOULD APPRECIATE SEEING SOME LAND.

HOW IS THE NEW JOB? DID YOU GET THAT RAISE? WHAT HAS FRANCES DECIDED TO DO OR HAS SHE ALREADY CHANGED HER JOB? WRITE ME LONG LETTERS, AND I MEAN LONG.

TAKE CARE OF YOURSELVES AND DON'T WORRY ABOUT ME, EVERYTHING WILL BE ALL RIGHT. JUST KEEP HOPING THAT THIS THING IS OVER WITH SOON. THAT'S ALL THAT MATTERS.

WRITE TO ME ON V-MAIL PAPER. IT'S MUCH FASTER. YOU CAN GET IT AT THE POST OFFICE.
ALL MY LOVE.
