

I'm feeling fine and dandy myself.

We sure got some workout today, and from now on it will be getting more steady, but I sure enjoy it.

Everything is humming with life now. Yesterday we received our leggings, underwear and a nice overcoat, and I'll say we will sure need it. Very soon our company will be up to war streangth [sic], and then there sure will be something

I wish I could be going
with the [R]ainbow division, be –
cause there will be something

France.

Artillery of our type is very scar[c]e over there, and from what I hear, we are the gents to drive the Boches out. I hope so anyway.

I have written to your Dad

Monday night, and will hear from
him in a few days I think.
