21 February 1952

Dearest Kids:

Good evening. What do you know Sam here in Honolulu. just came in this afternoon at 15 minutes to three. We left Itoami Thursday morning at ten o'clock went up to Itazumi Japan stayed there until two o'clock by the way of Midway Island. It took us ten hours to Midway. and six hours from Midway to here. and here it is still Thursday. Well here what they going to do. I be discharge on 28 and reenlisted on 29 of February and probably going back to Itoami on the 5 of March. I asked about a leave. But no soap. But I haven't see the colonel yet. If I can pull some thing I even try to get 15 days. other wise I just carry



my reenlistment over until I do  
get replacement. Now I have one  
of buck sergeant in charge of  
the shop. Beside I have quite few  
items to send back up there.

So that how the thing stand at  
the present times. I tell you if there  
is anything change. So you better  
keep your pants on. ha ha, ha,

Give the girls my best love  
and kiss for me.

Well dear how the life have been  
treating you these days. I hope you  
are fine.

Lets us call this a letter for  
now. Until I do hear from you.  
Good night.
