Dear Henri:

Robert Anderson, Robert M. Hutchins, Victor Babin, Herbert Bayer, and I have discussed the possibility of preparing for publication a volume of essays to honor the memory of Walter Paepcke. We think the project should be undertaken on condition, of course, that we can obtain the cooperation of Walter's friends and associates as contributors to the volume.

We would like to invite you to join us in this project and to contribute an essay. The essay, we feel, should be about your own special field of creative work, in which Walter had an interest.

Our conception of the volume as a whole is that it should reflect the many-sided interests of Walter Paepcke -- his deep involvement in so many different fields of endeavor. The list of possible contributors we have drawn up reflects this.

If each contributor, in addition to paying brief tribute to his memory of and association with Walter, then engages in a discussion of some theme or problem in his own field of work, the collection of essays will be truly representative of Walter's life and work.

With the possibility of our having between 20 and 24 contributors, each essay should be limited to about 15 double-spaced manuscript pages, though in some cases we can extend this to 20 where that much space is needed.


If all the essays are in hand by July 1, 1961, we can hope for publication early in 1962.
