Hello Folks;

Just got thru cleaning the barracks and sat down to write to you when a notice was received saying that our barracks would be inspected by Lt General Holcomb, on Friday. He is the Commanding officer of the Marines.

We had twelve fellows from the mess hall to help us and believe me the place is spotless. We scrubbed the decks or floors ^{twice} then swabbed or mopped them ^{twice}. When he goes thru here tomorrow he can run his white gloves any where in the barracks and not get his gloves dirty. The Mess Sergeant says that we are the best orderlies he has ever had in the barracks, and we don't intend to ever let him take those words back.

Just received your letter and it saddens me to know that mom is behaving in a bad manner again. Mary, I know how hard it is for you to put up with her for I lived with her for quite some time myself, but nevertheless she is still our

mother. I think that she takes advantage
of both of us because we both have soft
hearts. About the money, God knows I
would be more than glad to send some
home but I haven't been paid yet, and
when I do get paid there are so many uses
for the money that I didn't expect to send
money home the first pay day. Mary, you
can be frank with me if Mam really
needs money I'll see if I can send some
home next pay day.

Won't you please find out if Al Marshall
left for the Maines and if he did ask his
mother for his address. By the way please
look up the address of Dorothy Dill for me
she lives next door to Louis Tavern in
Clearing.

Haven't much to say right now because
mons behavior has deflated my spirit some
what. Wish she could realize that this
world wasn't made for one person but for
millions.
