Dear Folks:-

Received your letters dated Aug. 13 & 19 in the last couple of days. Was glad to hear that you enjoyed your vacation, as you both surely deserve it. In your letter you speak of it being rather dry. It surely is far from it over here having rained every day for about a week and a half. The mud is awful & it is quite chilly as the sun never gets through the clouds to warm up the air.

The fruit orchards over here are loaded down & we have lots of fresh fruit to eat besides all sorts of nuts which are beginning to ripen, so you see we wont starve.

Say folks if you have a little

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spare time, I wish you would send me a couple story magazines[[?]] as there is practically no reading matter over here & when we are up in front where no [[__1 word__]] or stores or Y.M.C.A.'s are it is impossible to get anything to read. I would thank you very much also, if you should send me a couple pair of heavy woolen sox as I have none except those on my feet & there is not much left of them & we do not know how soon we will be able to get any.

In your letter you asked me if I was still in the same division as I was in, in the states. I will say that I am, but I cannot mention the number as they are very particular about the mention of divisional numbers in letters. You probably have heard of us as the papers as it is an Illinois division & was commenDed by Pershing & several other

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high officers for its work on the Somme, where it received heavy casualties, but made a wonderful showing & started the big drive in that sector.
