You should know by now that whenever I have time to write I always write home first. About my being broke don't worry. I signed the pay roll today and am going to get six dollars Fri. Asked how come that was and they told ^{me} not to worry I would be paid in full some day.

Think that your M.O. has arrived. Received a notice to go to the P.O. and sign for a registered letter.

Spent all day Sunday at Balboa Park. It really was restful to get away from the base and forget about military life. Wished that the family was there with me. It was the ~~the~~ biggest and most beautiful zoo that I have ever seen. It is jammed full of animals and

snakes. Took Steve and I about five hours to walk around and then we had to glance at most of the sights.

Glad to hear that Eddie is interested in the problems of city defense. I know that he has the courage and the initiative to do a good job in not only keeping the alleys free of broken glass but any other job that needs a fearless fellow like him.

About the clippings I told you before and I'll tell you again. I really enjoy reading them. And about the short letters you write don't apologize, I am glad to hear from you any time even if your time is limited to writing a few lines to me.
