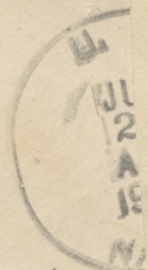
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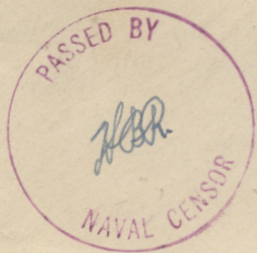

Received two letters last Wednesday and your letter of the 15th came yesterday. The air mail service between here and the states is really fast, isn't it.

Nice to hear that every thing is still alright. But you feel relieved now that the house work is almost done. Too bad about the paper in the back bedroom. That sort of spoils things somewhat, doesn't it? That double bunk for the children sounds swell. Where are you going to put it? In your bedroom or Moms. Things must be a little crowded at home with only two bedrooms. You haven't mentioned any thing about your own home lately. Are you still planning to buy your own or are you going to wait awhile.

Now for a little information, I know that you meant well Sis, but really I'm not broke. All you should have done was send the information about the magazines. It's too late now because the M.C. is probably on its way but in the future please no more money. I know that you have a tough enough time making ends meet with out sending me money besides

How is Mom doing? alright I hope. Is she saving some of her money? I hope she isn't spending her money like she used to. What does she do with the allotment she is getting? I should have made it out to you instead then she wouldn't have been so apt to spend it. If you ever run short and need money, that bond you bought is yours. I intended for you to spend it on the family and yourself. I don't want you to save any thing for me. So don't forget if you need money why just go right ahead and cash the bond. If you don't when I get home I'll cash it and spend it on you any way so please use it for yourself.

Glad to hear that Eddie was doing such a bang up job on the party. I hope that it was a huge success. You forgot to mention it in your last letter. Probably just slipped your mind. How is the Victory garden coming along? The sunshine you mentioned ought to be helping it right along.

Feel a little tired this P.M. because I washed some clothes this morning. Gosh

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I only had about twenty pieces to wash but
after boiling them and scrubbing, wringing and
hanging them up to dry I feel as if my back
were broke. I have a most wholesome respect
for women who do their own laundry, believe
me its a job. Incidentally, remember the times
that Edlie and I used to argue about this sub-
ject, well our modern service man has no such
convincers in the field. You have to get by the
best way you can out here and there is no
crying about conditions either.

to answer. I'll try to write to morrow but I
doubt if I can write a very interesting
