As usual everything is all right and my health is fine. My morale is good and that is the truth. Things are moving right along and it seems that they will continue to be that way.

Havent heard from Chris as yet but when I do, I'll let you have his address.

Received a letter from Helen and it surprised me because I hadn't heard from her after the just letter she wrote.

About the different things I write in my letters, well, that's pretty hard to explain in writing. If I were able to speak to you, I'm sure you would understand the reason I change my viewpoints. My moods are changeable because of the conditions here. I find that I can't be resentful of anyone for a period of time because the more I think about it the more reason I have in not being angry. Sounds rather silly, doesn't it, it's true tho. Time seems to change a persons perspective of certain things

In Lee's case I had ~~the~~ no reason to get angry, I was just feeling sorry for my self. The more I think about it, the more I wish that I were double jointed so I could give my self a good kick in the pants. Haven't heard from Steve yet but I hope to see him in the near future. I hope to find out the reason for his not writing.
