Jennifer recently graduated with High Honors from University High School. While at University, she held the following positions: President of the California Scholarship Federation (CSF), member of the Orange County Academic Decathlon team, and member of senior council. She also took courses at

Irvine Valley College and the University of California, Irvine through the University Program for High School Scholars. She has received the following academic awards during her high school years: CSF Life Member Sealbearer, National Merit Scholar Finalist, Presidential Scholar, National Council of Teachers of English 1997 Achievement Award Finalist, AP Scholar, and volunteer of the year with the One Step Further: Red Cross Club.

She was followed by Elaine Dysart, who was followed by her current piano teacher, Dr. Michael Martin of Chapman University (with whom she has studied for nearly six years). Jennifer would like to thank these four teachers for all of their time and dedication.

Through the Music Teacher's Association of California (MTAC) Certificate of Merit program, Jennifer has completed the Level 10 (Advanced) examination in Music Theory. She has performed in the MTAC honor recitals since 7th grade, and last year she performed at the MTAC convention in San Diego. Jennifer was a pianist in her high school's orchestra and Stage (Jazz) Band groups during her junior year. She was an alternate to the Regional Bach Festival, and she won Honorable Mentions in her division during 9th and 12th grades at the Cypress College Piano Competition, and also at the Musical Arts Festival in 6th grade.

Jennifer has spent her summers with the Women in Engineering Program at the University of Maryland, College Park (1996) and with the Junior State Symposium at the University of California, Davis (1995). She is spending this summer interning for California Senate Republican Leader Robert Hurtt (R-Garden Grove). This fall Jennifer plans to attend the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and major in computer science, with some financial assistance from the Fluor Foundation. She hopes to eventually pursue a career in law.

While not doing schoolwork or practicing piano, Jennifer enjoys playing ice hockey, taking care of her Tamagotchi, writing e-mail, creating newer and better ways to misspell words, and going the distance in her American luxury automobile.
