

Some of the islands, in which we spent five days, were beautiful, and I have to admit that the Acropolis is quite a handsome proposition. I was distressed with your report of Uruguay. Ever since I learned that it had no income tax I had been planning to move there. The inflationary situation in Chile makes it seem financially unattractive.
