This wont be a very informative letter as I dont know exactly what the score is myself.

We left Hefgerimar yesterday morning, and came here. It's about 150 miles. This place is about 35 miles from Frankfurt on Main. all I know is that they say we probably wont be here over 3 or 4 days. That's enough as this is a tent city. It doesn't look as tho' we'll leave Germany either. When we left the company they said we'd go to France. Well, I guess we'll just have to wait and see what happens.

Last nite we went to town to see a movie. Saw, "The Woman in the Window." It was real good. Two of us came from the signal Co. This fellow is from Cleveland.

I'm using my old address until I get a new one. Dont write till I get the new address tho' sweetie as it would probably take weeks to forward my mail anyway.

I love you so very much darling, and now I believe that everything that happens is another step

toward home. That is the day we're looking for
sweetie, and may it come soon.
