Please forgive me for falling down on the letter writing the past couple days honey. There's so little to write about. My mail should be catching up with me soon, and then I'll be be able to write a decent letter again.

It seems as tho' ever since I came overseas I'm always shifting around so I'm always waiting for mail. Oh well maybe it wont be so much longer now, and I'll be coming home, and we wont have to write any more letters darling. That will be such a wonderful day sweetheart when we can talk to each other instead of having to write.

I finally got my watch fixed. There was a jeweler in Hofgeizmar that would have taken it, but he was sending all the watches to Frankfurt to be repaired, and wouldn't have got it back for two months. I didn't think I'd be around there that long so I thought I'd better wait. This fellow here in Lich only took three days, and charged me eighty five cents. Sure seems good to have her ticking again.

It was just one year today that I walked the gang plank in New York. Seems like a million years ago. Anyway we can be thankful that the war with the Japs is over, and when I get on a boat again it will be to come home for good.

I love you so very much darling, and I'm just existing till that happy day when we can enjoy our good way of life together again. There'll be so many things we'll want to do that we wont know where to start, but most of all we'll make love. We'll just love all the time sweetie. You're such a dear sweet wonderful lover. I just wish I knew words elegant enough to tell you just how wonderful I think you are sweetie, but there just don't seem to be any. But when I come home I'll show you honey.

I'm enclosing millions of hugs and kisses and all my love.
