My dear Colleague:

Thank you very much for your gracious note of the 19th. Delighted that you had the pleasure of a visit with Harvey Fletcher and Vern Knudsen, both of whom lie close to my heart. Vern's sister passed away a few days ago, and Mable went to Salt Lake City for the memorial services and had a brief visit with Vern. He told her of the pleasant chat he had with you and Harvey.

It would be more than a pleasure to have the Paganini Quartet with us this summer were it not for the fact that we have already engaged the Hartt String Quartet for five concerts and also have three other concerts the week of July 27. Even more disturbing is the fact that our very humble budget doesn't permit us to offer you a decent honorarium, or we would do so. On Wednesday evening, July 29, is the only open date which we can see that would be at all consistent for you. We recall with very great pleasure the 118 concerts you gave under the auspices of Brigham Young University, 112 of them on the campus and an even dozen at Farmington. We still believe that no one carries more punch and charm in his explanations than do you.

All of us of the Clark clan send to you and the lovely lady at your side, plus the two promising young men--your sons--our very best. Your many friends in this region feel the same way. If you have time, I hope you will drop in and see us. The new Fine Arts building is rapidly nearing completion. It is one of the excellent structures on the continent, and then, too, we have a great many other buildings which will interest you.
