My dear Aaron:

We are preparing for the Los Angeles premiere of your complete concert version of the "Appalachian Spring" in its original instrumentation. The entire program will be a tribute to the memory and achievements of Elizabeth Sprague Coolidge, consisting of works commissioned by her, namely yours, Respighi's Botticellian Triptych, and Honegger's Concerto da Camera. The date of the concert is December 16.

I am wondering if you would care to write something in the form of a personal reminiscence in connection with this special tribute to Mrs. Coolidge.

I hope you will forgive me for another request, which you must simply ignore if it is too presumptuous. The California Chamber Symphony manages to survive and cover its deficits through an annual auction (in addition to grants by the National Endowment in Washington, etc.). Is there anything that you would be willing to contribute? Perhaps something that would have special meaning in relation to the "Appalachian Spring"? A phrase from it, copied in your hand, with a dedication? I am only searching. It would tremendously enhance this year's auction and arouse much enthusiasm among your many admirers.
