Dear Henri:

Thank you for sending me a copy of your December 28th letter to the Los Angeles Times.

I felt that after eight years I could no longer remain silent. Obviously no one objects to negative reviews of bad performances -- on the contrary, what really does upset me is positive criticism of inferior events (and this happens in Los Angeles far too often from critics whose major acquaintance with performances comes from recordings). What I think this community needs is informed, authoritative musical leadership and criticism.

A critic needs not only knowledge and writing ability, but also love and enthusiasm, so that even when he criticizes adversely he does not destroy. These are the criteria I miss in Los Angeles' critics and I do believe the development of a musically cultured community has been impeded by the very inferior quality of the music criticism and comment disseminated by all the media hereabouts -- newspapers, magazines, radio and television.
