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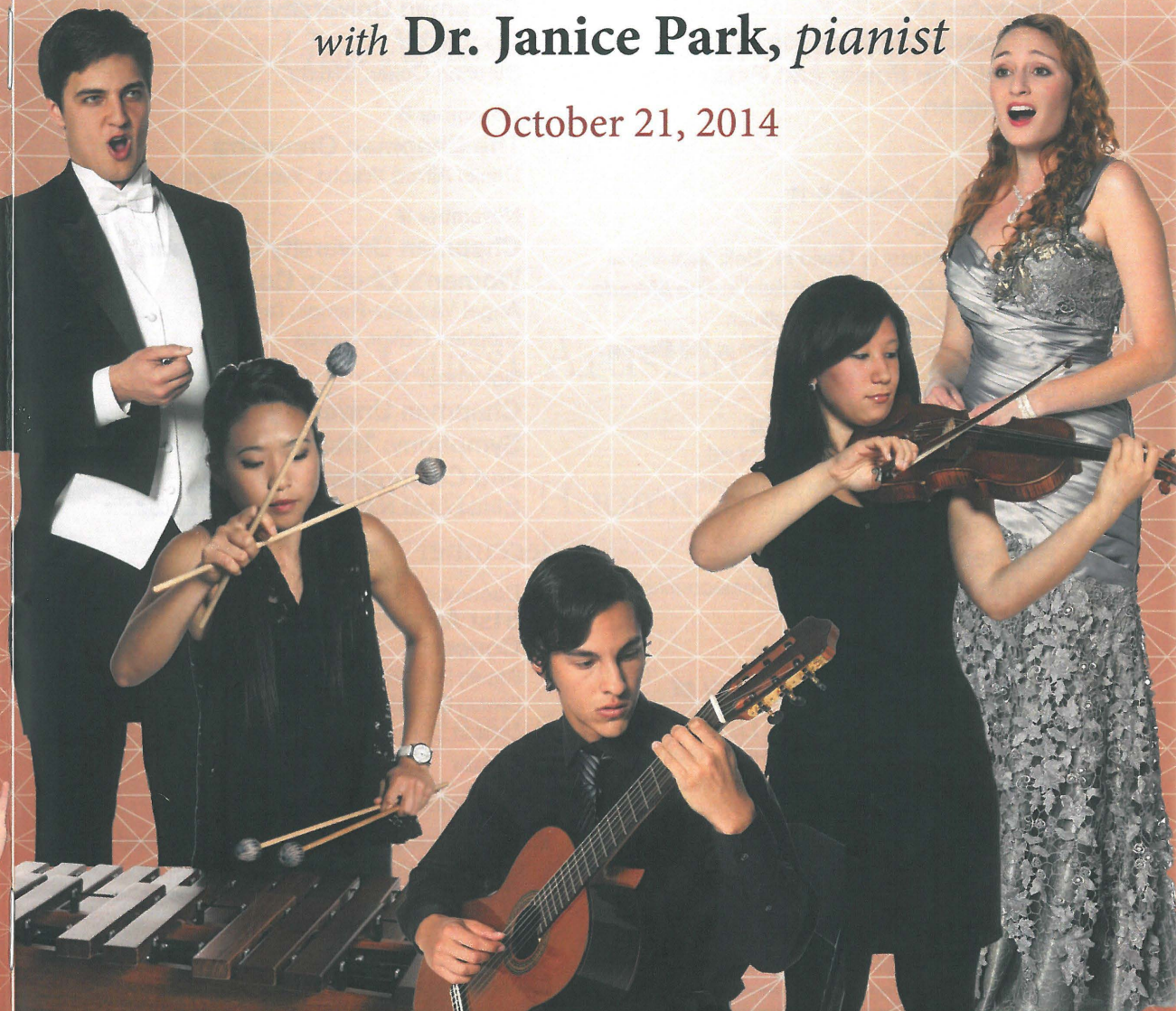

About the Artists

Thomas Hooten joined the Los Angeles Philharmonic as principal trumpet in 2012. Prior to his appointment by Gustavo Dudamel, Thomas was principal trumpet with the Atlanta Symphony from 2006-2012.

In 2000, Thomas won a trumpet/cornet position with "The President's Own" United States Marine Band in Washington, D.C., where he was often a featured soloist. While living in the D.C area, he performed with various groups which include the National Symphony Orchestra, Washington Symphonic Brass, Richmond Symphony, and Baltimore Symphony. Following his four year enlistment in the Marine Band, Thomas was appointed assistant principal trumpet with the Indianapolis Symphony, a position he held in 2004-2006.

Originally from Tampa, FL, he earned his BM from the University of South Florida, his MM from Rice University, and his primary trumpet teachers have included Armando Ghitalla, John Hagstrom, and Don Owen.

Thomas has appeared as a soloist with the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, United States Air Force Band, Keystone Winds, and Richmond Symphony Orchestra. He regularly gives master classes and recitals across the United States and internationally. While in Atlanta, he shared a studio with his wife, Jennifer Marotta, at Kennesaw State University. Together, in 2013, they edited the newest edition of Arban's *Complete Conservatory Method for Trumpet*, published by Carl Fischer.

Thomas can be heard on numerous Los Angeles Philharmonic recordings, including Mahler's *Symphony No. 9*, Stravinsky's *Firebird*, Debussy's *La Mer*, and Lutoslawski's *Symphony No. 1*. With the Atlanta Symphony, some of the works he recorded are Scriabin's *Poeme of Ecstasy*, Brahms' *Requiem*, Puccini's *La Boheme*, and Gandolfi's *Garden of Cosmic Speculation*. In 2011, Thomas released his first solo album, *Trumpet Call*, and in 2013, he recorded Arban's *14 Characteristic Studies*.



About the Artists



Janice Park, DMA, is an instructor of music and Coordinator of Secondary Piano at the Hall-Musco Conservatory of Music at Chapman University. She is also 1st Vice President and Program Chair of the Music Teachers' Association of California Orange County Branch. A native of South Korea, Dr. Park came to USA after graduating Seoul Music & Arts High School, to further her musical education. She received both Master degree and Doctorate of Musical Arts in Piano Performance from the University of Southern California and a Bachelor's degree

in Piano Performance from Chapman University. Her major teachers included Dr. Joseph Matthews, James Bonn, and Antoinette Perry. Dr. Park taught music theory and was the pianist for Women's Choir at Chapman. She has also been a faculty member at the Irvine Valley College for 15 years, the Pasadena Conservatory of Music and an Assistant Lecturer at USC. Dr. Park has received numerous honors and awards.

Dr. Park has been active in solo, ensemble and collaborative recitals, including: performances with the concert master of the Pacific Symphony, as a soloist with Chapman Orchestra, Piano Trio recital at USC and chamber recital at the Colburn School in Los Angeles. She was invited twice by Detroit Chamber Winds & Strings to perform both chamber and solo music. In the past year she was the featured pianist for two separate world premiere concerts, one locally and one in South America. She is frequently sought to act as a clinician and as an adjudicator for competitions and piano festivals.

She is a member of Music Teachers National Association (MTNA), Music Teachers' Association of California (MTAC), and Pi Kappa Lambda National Music Honor Society. She has served as a member of the Board of Directors of the Musical Arts Club of Orange County. Her article on how to teach piano students was published in the piano magazine, *Keyboard Companion*
