Dear Sir:

With reference to your claim that Artur Rubinstein is now 88 (TIME, February 10, 1975, Page 39), allow me to shed some additional confusion on this hottly debated issue. In a Rubinstein monograph published in 1956 by Rene Kister (Geneva), the writer, Bernard Gavoty, then music critic of the respected Paris Figaro, quotes Rubinstein directly and emphatically as follows (the next voice you will hear is that of Artur Rubinstein):

"But, how old do you think I am, my dear chap? Not as old as Riemann does, I hope! When I open that villainous dictionary I stifle with rage! He generously makes me sixty-nine years of age and I'm only sixty-six. Three years mean something, you know! Of course it was tempting to him to have me born at Lodz in 1886, in the same year that Liszt died at Bayreuth: that gave me honourable connections - but, very sorry! I was born in 1889, on the 28th January, one day after Mozart, whose birthday is the 27th. Oh, these legends!" (Underlining, my emphasis)

I enclose a xerox of the quote in the hope that you may, at long last, have no further difficulty in establishing beyond the peradventure of a doubt that Rubinstein's exact age remains a bundle of contradictions, a dubious riddle wrapped inside an impenetrable mystery.
