Michael Dukakis Speaks on Campus Feb. 12

Former Presidential candidate Michael Dukakis will offer a talk on political campaigning, activism and U.S. politics -- The 2008 Presidential Election: What Is at Stake? -- on Tuesday, February 12, at 1:30 p.m. in the Argyros Forum, Room 209, on the Chapman University campus. The presentation is free and open to the campus community and the public. For more information, the public can call 714-997-6565.

This timely event will take place one week after the Super Tuesday primaries, and Mr. Dukakis will share his expertise on the subject of Presidential campaigns in general, as well as the 2008 campaign in particular.

Mr. Dukakis was the Democratic candidate for U.S. President in 1988 and defeated by George H.W. Bush in a race that is still reviewed by experts and students of election campaigns. He was the longest-serving governor in Massachusetts history (1975-79 and 1983-91). He is a graduate of Swarthmore College and Harvard Law School, and since 1991 has been a Distinguished Professor of Political Science at Northeastern University and visiting professor at the School of Public Policy and Social Research at UCLA. He and the late former U.S. Senator Paul Simon co-authored the book *How to Get Into Politics And Why*, designed to encourage young people to think seriously about politics and public service as a career.
